Special Olympics and ESPN teamed up for a pep rally to honor Conard and Hall High Schools' Unified Sports® participants for meeting national standards of excellence in the areas of inclusion, advocacy, and respect. During the event, which took place at Conard High School on March 28th, student athletes participated in Unified cornhole and basketball and cheered loudly as their new Unified Champion School Banner was unveiled. ESPN's Victoria Arlen co-emceed the event with students, ESPN employees volunteered and Lt. Governor Susan Bysiewicz was a special guest speaker.

Unified teammates from Oxford High School took on opponents from Windsor High School in the first-ever Connecticut Unified Level 1 Championship game at Mohegan Sun. Oxford edged out Windsor in a very close and exciting game - ending it with a three-point basket made at the buzzer!


